






November Family Home Learning Project

It helps to view question 12 in the context of

questions 1 to 3: children's happiness, feeling safe and behaviour. From the responses, it is encouraging to note that despite some concerns about bullying and behaviour, this doesn't necessarily affect children's happiness or safety.

Behaviour management is a joint responsibility between the parent/carer, the child and the school. Children come to school with a range of experiences that shape how they interact with their peers and adults. The policies and procedures that we have developed are there to give all children the best chances of building successful relationships and to manage challenging situations.

Ask your child how they are continually reminded about our behaviour expectations. Strategies include: daily focus on our School Rules (Be Ready, Be Safe, Be Respectful) and on our LEARNERS Values. We focus on catching children making good choices to encourage others to do the same. More discreet conversations take place with children who require reminders or support. Our class rewards systems include a 3-stage Recognition Board with class targets to achieve, a marble jar to achieve a class prize and special LEARNERS Ambassador postcard for exceptional behaviour.

Each Monday, we introduce a special aspect of behaviour expectations linked to our school values that we focus on throughout the week. These include ppractical; examples on what that behaviour looks like. On Friday, we celebrate those children from across the school who have modelled these particularly well. They receive a special certificate and our unique LEARNERS Baton that is passed on every week to the next child in their class. Other awards include certificates for being an Upstander or a Special Friend (see page 3).

Unstructured times (morning break or lunch time) tend to be when incidents of poor decision-making take place. We ensure that there is adequate supervision with adults wearing a high viz vest to be easily accessible. Children learn to play a variety of games and a great range of equipment is available at lunchtime. Areas of the playground are zoned to ensure safe play. Football is available but only in certain places and at times when it is safe and there is staff supervision. Indoor structured lunch is available for children who may find being outside overwhelming.



In the event of a behaviour or bullying incident, children know to inform an available adult or to seek help from the Year 6 Head Girl and Boy, their Deputies and the Prefects who are trained to support children. Staff on duty carry note books to follow up on issues and investigate. If children have concerns, they can also access Place 2 Talk and each class has either a Worry Monster or Worry Box to post a note for their teacher to follow up on. To make the playground even more enjoyable, we have recently introduced Sports Leaders — more Year 6 children who want to support their younger peers in constructive play and make a positive contribution to their school.

All incidents of poor behaviour are thoroughly investigated, recorded and followed up. Children are given time to reflect during their break or lunch time on making improvements with designated adults such as the Leaning Mentor and are given the opportunity to put things right. Repeat incidents are escalated to the Senior Leadership Team and of course parents will be informed.



We have been exploring 'The Piano'- a story about an old man that is 'visited by a number of memories' while playing a beautiful tune.




